What we do

Native Homeownership Curriculum Overview

- Set to launch in March 2021 stretching through 12 weeks.
- Curriculum will include weekly virtual webinar sessions & certificate of completion.
- Will include up to 25 representatives from tribal housing organizations

Native Homeownership Curriculum Participant Expectations

- **Availability and commitment to attend all sessions.** Participants can't miss more than two (2) sessions. The training will be held virtually over a 12-week period beginning March 25, June 10, 2021, meeting every Thursday at 2:00 pm Eastern for 1.5 hours.
- **Ability to participate in the sessions via video conference/Zoom.** Participants must have technology to support virtual participation, including a computer with webcam, and stable internet access.
- **Commitment to providing homeownership opportunities for tribal members.** Participants must demonstrate a commitment to expanding an existing homeownership program or developing a new program.

Benefits

- Participants that complete all 12 sessions will receive a Certificate of Completion.
- Participants that complete all 12 sessions will receive a presentation template for presenting to Board members and Tribal Leadership on elements of a homeownership program.
- Participants will be able to demonstrate core competencies upon completing the course.

Call for Applications Overview-Eligibility

- Organizations serving Native American communities with a defined mission that includes affordable housing such as Tribes, Tribally Designated Housing Entities (TDHEs), Tribal Housing Authorities (THAs), Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs), Community Development Corporations (CDCs) and Native Community Development Financial Institutions (CDFIs)

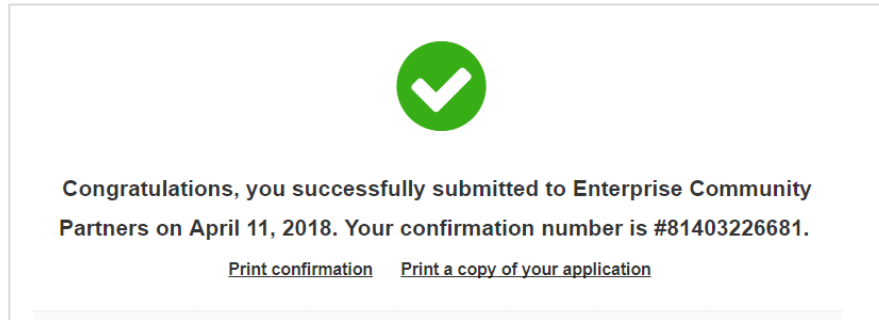
- Applicants must register and create an account in SlideRoom

Call for Applications Overview-Scoring Criteria

- Applications will be scored on the following factors:
 - ❖ Demonstrated interest in and capacity to participate in the cohort for the duration
 - ❖ Potential for the Cohort to meaningfully further the enhancement or implementation of the organization's homeownership program
 - ❖ The organization's commitment to homeownership
